Crew Kicks Off Major Fundraiser

This past spring semester, varsity rower and studio art major, Christine Dengel '05 took time out of her schedule to create several silkscreen and monotype prints geared towards a major fundraiser to purchase two eights for the Binghamton Crew.



Her crew series explores a broad range of the aspects of rowing, from the quiet mornings on the Susquehanna to the intensity of a 2k.

Dengel states, "The majority of work I've done in this series so far is primarily monochromatic. I mix my own inks, so there is a little bit of color in my blacks. This past spring semester I've experimented with the monotype technique. I plan



on working with color in this fall semester as I learn the silkscreen process."

Monotypes are pulled impressions that were drawn or painted on a metal plate. The images are created through applications of ink that are rolled, brushed, daubed or otherwise manipulated. The inked plate and paper are run through a press once, which yields a one of a kind print. Monotypes, like

drawings and paintings, are inherently unique because only one (or possibly two) impressions may be pulled before the ink is used up. Although there may be a second impression, it is quite different from the first.

The process of serigraphy or silkscreen printing entails rendering an image on a screen of silk or other fine mesh, where specific areas are designated to be covered by screen filler or left to expose the mesh. Ink is then forced across the surface of the screen by a squeegee, allowed to penetrate the screen to the paper underneath, only

where the screen was left open. Every image in the series is intended to be identical, contrary to the monotype technique.

“My goal for this semester is to integrate several colors and so several layers for each of my silk-screens ” says Dengel. “I want them to remain as atmospheric as my monotypes, yet make them more defined. In general, I feel like my first attempt in this series addressed rowing in general, but in my upcoming prints I would like to impose the specifics of *our* boathouse, *our* river, *our* landmarks, and *our* rowers into my pieces. There is a common bond among all rowers- you know it’s there because anytime you recognize a stranger as a rower because of some crew shirt he’s wearing, you feel the need to approach that person. What I would like to represent in the upcoming silk-screens are the fine traditions of Binghamton Crew, which makes us proud of our work and makes us eager to meet other rowers who share the same passion.”

The images available for viewing at this moment are the monotype series. The original monotypes are not for sale until May 2005, prices negotiable. Presently, those monotype images are available as 11”x17” duplicated copies in an edition of 100, professionally matted for \$50 each. The upcoming silk-screens will range from one color, to five colors per print. The edition sizes will vary from ten to fifty. These are not duplicated copies, but prints hand-pulled by the artist and signed by the artist. These prices will range from \$200 to \$600 per matted and framed print. Duplicated copies of the silk-screens will range from \$40 to \$70.

Curse or Bad Luck: The Story of a BU Shell

In the July 2004 issue of *Rowing News*, Jeff Moeg authored an article entitled “From Bad to Worse, Three cautionary tales where the worse that could happen actually did.” In this piece Jeff writes of a bazaar accident in which an undefeated Harvard crew racing in the finals of the Ladies’ Challenge Plate at Henley, hit a submerged log and ended a magical season; near-miss series of victories where Peter Michael Kolbe failed to take gold in two Olympic

single finals being rowed down in the last 500 meter in both races; and a harrowing collision where Canadian sculler Silken Laumann almost lost her leg when the bow of a men’s pair slammed into her right leg tearing away muscle and fracturing her bones just 10 weeks before the 1992 Olympics.

Every boat club has similar stories as the one Moeg presents, although maybe not as dramatic or on such a grand stage, and Binghamton is no exception. Over the past few years a small number of events come to mind. The *Kate* hitting a bridge abutment at the Head of the Fish, and a few years later striking a submerged log in front of the Marshland Road boathouse and sinking; a varsity rower being ejected by a crab with just a few hundred meters left before the finish line while racing on the Schuylkill, and the *Hogan* and the *Class of 63* colliding on the Susquehanna River during an early morning outing.



But three events stand out more than any others: After a brilliant start, a certain BU boat was well in the lead with less than a third of the race to go when they slammed into a men’s novice four crossing the racecourse, illegally mind you. The BU boat came to an abrupt and sudden halt and so did the chance for them to win Binghamton’s first medal in that category. Quick thinking and an even quicker recovery by cox and crew; they were off again, chasing down the pack that just seconds before had passed them by. The crew had just enough fight to climb back to second before they ran out of water and time. Injuries, although minor, and slight damage to the shell prevented a re-row.

A second accident occurred when a Binghamton boat was warming up in the designated area at a race. Someone near the bow, on starboard side, bellowed out an expletive as their oar blade dug into an underwater shelf as he attempted to take a catch that would make Dan Hogan proud.

Milliseconds later the entire boat shuttered as it ran over the shelf. This underwater rock shelf went on to tear a 1-½ inch gash from two seat down to seven. The crew barely got the boat back to the dock as water rapidly filled the shell up past the top of the foot stretchers.

The last of the three accidents has little details, mainly because there were few witnesses. This one took place as the crew was traveling to a regatta. All that is really known of this event is the shell, while on the trailer, crashed into a pole holding a sign and lost part of the stern.

What is remarkable about these three accidents are that they all happened to the same shell, going to or at the same regatta and all occurred in a cyclical pattern.

- The boat: *S. Fenton Busfield*
- The race: Metropolitan Intercollegiate Championships
- The pattern: Every three years.

The first accident took place in 1997, the *Fenton's* first trip to the regatta. It was the Binghamton varsity men who plowed into a Fordham novice four. Three years later, in 2000, again it was the Binghamton varsity men who ran over the underwater shelf nearly sinking the *Fenton* in the Orchard Park Lagoon. Then again three years later in 2003 the *Fenton* lost its stern in a battle with a pole.

Since being donated, graciously by the Fenton/Rees family in 1996, the *S. Fenton Busfield* has seen plenty of good times and bad times. She has been and still is a good shell for the Binghamton University Crew. I am not a superstitious person and I don't believe in curses but I implore the e-board and

the coaches not to take the *Fenton* to the 2006 Metropolitan Intercollegiate Championships. In fact as the progression has gone; first during the race, next warming up, and lastly to the race, maybe the team should think about keeping the *Fenton* on the rack the week prior to the Met Cup.


